Discerning

What is church planting, and <u>why is it important</u>? How do we discern viable opportunities in our diocese? What should we look for in a potential church planter or redeveloper? We host week-long assessment retreats to help individual leaders discern their gifts, competencies and capacity for church planting work, or congregational redevelopment. Learn more about these retreats and see a schedule <u>here</u>.

Coaching

Without a doubt, one of the best indicators of success is whether a ministry developer is receiving coaching. A good coach is outside of the leader's local and diocesan network, and will help keep them encouraged and on track. We keep a <u>list of trained</u> and trusted coaches on our website and can often help with a recommendation based on the leader's context and needs.

Training

Our mission is to grow the courage and capacity of ministry leaders and dioceses to dive into the work of church planting. We are building a structure of online and inperson trainings for both planters and diocesan leaders, as well as posting a variety of resources to accompany you on the journey. So far, these include:

- Regular Third Thursday conversations at 1:00 Eastern with church planters across the country. While not technically a "training," these offer the opportunity to meet other missional leaders, talk about successes and challenges, and tackle a topics that are relevant to new ministry leaders.
- The New Episcopal Communities Activator training, held twice a year
- **Koinonia**, co-sponsored by the office of Ethnic Ministries, is an event intended to nurture church planting leaders in minority contexts in the U.S. and in Province IX
- The "What to Expect Guide" to New Episcopal Communities
- Guides for Ministry Plans and Benchmarks for New Episcopal Communities

Funding

For the last three triennia, General Convention has approved funding for New Episcopal Community grants. If renewed in 2022, grant funding will likely be available in early 2023. Grants prioritize church plants among people who have been historically underrepresented in The Episcopal Church, and they are intended to be a financial partnership with the local diocese. Re-Vision and Renew

The other side of our office is <u>Congregational Redevelopment</u> - related to, but different from, church planting.

neighbors? What invigorating enterprises might arise? Where might your church be in five years if it practices fresh ways of reimagining, reaching out, and relating to your community?
